## Cottages Without 4 Acres

Throughout the reign of Charles I men were indicted at the Assizes for erecting or maintaining a cottage which did not have the 4 acres of land stipulated by statute. Those occurring between 1638 and 1647 are described here.

The February 1638 Assizes had eight indictments for this, three of them for cottages in Penshurst.

#### Entry 1633<sup>12</sup>:

Thomas Myles of Penshurst yeoman, was indicted for maintaining a cottage at Penshurst for 3 months from 1st March 1638 without 4 acres of land stipulated by statute

#### Entry 1640:

Henry Willett of Hartfield, Sussex, yeoman, was indicted for erecting a cottage at Penshurst on 1st February 1638 without the 4 acres of land stipulated by statute endorsed. True bill

Prior to the Assizes, Thomas Myles and Henry Willett had each been served with a writ *venire facias* presumably instructing them to attend the Assizes (entry 1621).

#### Entry 1641:

Walter Weekes of Penshurst husbandman, was indicted for erecting a cottage at Penshurst on 1st February 1638 without the 4 acres of land stipulated by statute endorsed: True bill

#### Entry 1698:

At the February 1639 Assizes **Walter Weekes**, husbandman, and **Henry Willett**, yeoman of Penshurst, and **Thomas Myles** of Penshurst yeoman, were served with writs *capias*. Here Henry Willett is described as "of Penshurst".

#### Entry 2078

At the March 1642 Assizes, **Walter Weekes** and **William Willett**, carpenters, and **Thomas Mills<sup>13</sup>**, labourer, of Penshurst were indicted for maintaining cottages at Penshurst for 3 months from 1st December 1641 without the 4 acres of land stipulated by statute.

#### Entry 2285:

At the August 1645 Assizes **Gilbert Symondes of Kemsing**, yeoman, was indicted for erecting a cottage at Kemsing on 1st September 1644 without the 4 acres of land stipulated by statute.

#### The House of Correction

Those found guilty at the Assizes were occasionally sent to the House of Correction. This form of punishment was mentioned only twice in Elizabeth's reign (1559-1603) and twice in the reign of James I (1603-1625) but eighteen times in that of Charles I (1625-1648). Of those in the time of Charles I, six were in 1631 and nine in 1637.

#### 1585 to 1612

The two references in Elizabeth's reign, in February 1585 and July 1591, were both for vagrancy, in each case involving people from Maidstone who were indicted for vagrancy and sent to the house of correction<sup>14</sup>. There were many similar cases but none of the other vagrants were punished in this way.

In March 1607 **Thomas Gibson**, a sailor from Erith, was indicted for seditious words. On 27th February 1607, at Erith, he publicly said "That the kings majesty was no king but an ass. And he, Thomas, would make a fool and an ass of him."

Gibson confessed and was sentenced to be pilloried and whipped at Rochester and Maidstone and then sent to the house of correction. <sup>15</sup>

In February 1612, Francis Clarke and John Netter, labourers of Lewisham, were indicted for assault. On 21st October 1611 they assaulted **Henry Wade** in the highway as **Lewisham**. They were found guilty and sent to the house of correction <sup>16</sup>

#### March 1631 Assizes

At the March 1631 Assizes, **Thomas Norman** (i2771), of Ightham, **labourer**, was indicted for grand larceny. On 1st September 1630, "at Ightham, he stole a cloak (2s), a pair of breeches (2s) and 2 doublets (2s) from an unknown man".

The charge was endorsed as a "true bill". Norman was found guilty but he was allowed benefit of clergy. He was, however, sent to the house of correction for one month  $^{17}$ 

A very unusual reference is that concerning **Henry Morrys of Stone**, labourer, who was found not guilty of highway robbery. Even so, he was to be "set at work in the house of correction by the space of a month unless in the meantime some person having authority shall receive him and employ him in the wars beyond the seas". <sup>18</sup>

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## Ightham - Inventory of the Parish Goods

An inventory of the Ightham Parish Goods was taken in 1552 when **William Herde**<sup>19</sup> was rector with **John Godfrey**, curate, also being mentioned. This inventory included the item: "Stolen by one **Peryman**, one albe, 3 altar cloths, 2 laten candlesticks, 4 pewter cruetts, a holy water stoup and 3 corporas cases."

Various parishioners paid sums of money "unto William Hyde, gent., surveyor to our Sovereign lord the King" in what seems to be payment for certain of the church goods. Two of these were John Wryght<sup>20</sup> and John Syseley, parishioners of Ightham, from whom William Hyde received 8s "for Canes light" (The Story of Ightham, F.J.Bennett, Homeland Association Limited, 1907, p.65)

Perhaps this was a light from the Sir Thomas tomb, the earliest one to be built it in the church. Sir Thomas was the first known owner of Ightham Mote and probably built its Great Hall. He died in 1374 and the carving of the tomb is "a notable and well-preserved example of medieval craftsmanship" - see Edward V. Bowra, *Ightham*, p. 14 for a description of this.

The previous rector had left in 1546 and John Hooper became rector in 1569.

#### *Indentures*

The following indentures and writings are just a selection from the many which have survived. The first two concern loans made to John Tebold, a wealthy gentleman from Seal using land as security for them. The third describes some land in Kemsing which was sold, in 1591, for £60 and the fourth concerns land bought by Steven Tebold, John Tebold's son.

Only the second of the three Waghorne indentures from the beginning of the seventeenth century has been transcribed. The next describes the sale of the rents of Wickhurst of Leigh to Nathaniell Studley of Grey's Inn in London whose wife came from Sevenoaks where they both spent a considerable amount of time. The rents for Wickhurst manor are then given for 1615 and 1620.

The land which John Dunmole sold to Thomas Haselden and been forfeited to John when Robert Polhill who had mortgaged it to him failed to repay the mortgage. The last indenture given here concerns the sale of 100 acres with a "messuage or farmhouse" in Leigh and Tonbridge.

# Defeasance 1564 between John Tebold and Thomas Swaynsland of Seal

This indenture (**CKS**: U/1000/5) was written on 25th August 1564 by either John or Nicholas Hooper (probably the former) who, with other members of the family, wrote many wills for people in the Sevenoaks locality from about 1560 until at least 1650.

The indenture records the apparent sale for £40 of two parcels of land by Thomas Swaynsland to John Tebold. But, from the second part of the indenture, it appears that Thomas has given these two parcels to John Tebold as security for a loan of £40 which was to be repaid on 26th March 1569. If this payment is made "at the dwelling house of John Tibold . . . the said deed or writing of confirmation . . with their present and obligation hereupon made shall be utterly void and of none effect" If Thomas does not fully repay the £40 at the said date, there seem to be further complicated arrangements.

John Tebold's will, written in 1575, has survived - see Families & Transcripts for details of his family and will. Thomas Swaynsland is described as the son and heir (while he lived) of John Swaynsland. He could have been the son of the John Swaynsland whose will of 1553 has survived.- see Families & Transcripts

#### Indenture 25th August 1564

### Indenture: John Tebold & John Duble, 1586

This indenture of 1586 (CKS: U/1000/T28) describes how John Tebold, gentleman, was to receive £20 from John Duble of Seal, glover, in return for which Duble was to receive an annuity or yearly rent of forty shillings issuing out of a messuage and lands called Shoodes estimated at 140 acres and situated in Underriver and Shipbourne.

The text includes the word "yeven" often used by Nicholas Hooper who wrote many wills and other documents. However, the letters included with the decoration at the end could be J and L and the last witness was John Langley so that he was probably the scriptor. Since this was an indenture, two copies were made, the one which has survived is the "present writing indented remaining with the said John Duble (to which) I, the said John Tebold, have set my hand and Seal". John Duble set his hand to the one which remained with John Tebold.

The John Tebold of the 1564 indenture died in 1578; the John Tebold of this indenture could have been his son ( $\#1750^{25}$ ) who had married in 1585 when he

was twenty-four. Described in the indenture as "gentleman", he could have been in need of money to get himself established.

When the indenture was written John Duble (#877) was living with his father, Ralph Duble (#1726) in a mansion house in Underriver. Ralph wrote his will in 1582 but did not die until January 1587 about six weeks after the writing of the indenture.

## A Loan of Twenty Pounds

The lengthy document details a complex arrangement whereby Tebold could receive a lump sum of which he was presumably in need. Initially Duble's annuity is described as "forever" but, after describing in detail the buildings and land from which the annuity is to be paid and what Duble can do if payment is not paid, there is a proviso. If in 1588, Tebold pays Duble £20 in addition to the annuity for that year, then the annuity will cease. Thus Tebold was using this arrangement to borrow £20 for which he was paying an annual interest of 10%.

#### Indenture: John Tebold & John Duble

- To all christian people unto whom the present writing indented shall come, I, John Tebold of Seal in the county of Kent, **gentleman**, send greetings in our lord everlasting. Know
- ye that the said John Tebold for and in consideration of the sum of twenty pounds of good lawful money of England to me by **John Duble** of Seal, aforesaid, **glover**, well and truly before
- 3 the ensealing of these present in hand paid, whereof I, the said John Tebold,do acknowledge myself fully satisfied and paid. And thereof and of every part and parcel thereof do acquit, exonerate and discharge
- the said John Duble, his heirs, executors and administrators and every of them by these present forever, have bargained and sold, given and granted, and by this my present writing indented
- do bargain and sell, give and grant unto the said John Duble, his heirs and assigns, forever, one annuity or yearly rent of forty shillings of good and lawful money of England issuing
- and going to be taken out of an in all that my messuage or tenement and all the barns, stables, stawles and other edifices and buildings thereto belonging, set, lying and being at **Underriver** in Seal aforesaid.

- And out of and in all those my lands, arable, meadows, pastures, feedings, woods and underwoods to the said tenement belonging or within the same now letten. Both the said tenement and
- the said lands are called and known by the name of **Shoodes** or by whatsoever other name or names they are and have been called and known by. And contain, in the whole, by estimation,
- 9 seven score acres, be it more or less, severally set, lying and being in diverse parcels in the parishes of Seal and **Shipbourne** in the said county of Kent. And is all of it now in the tenure
- and occupation of Lawrence Porter<sup>26</sup>. To have and to hold, levy, ?? and take the said annuity or yearly rent of the said places out of all and singular the said messuage or tenement
- and other buildings and out of all and singular the said lands arable, meadows, pastures, feedings, woods and underwoods and every and any of them with their appurtenances in the occupation
- of the said Lawrence Porter, or any part or parcel thereof, unto him the said John Duble, his heirs and assigns, in and upon the feast day of Saint Andrew the Apostle yearly. And the

- and truly content and satisfy and pay or cause to be contented and paid to the said John Duble, his heir, executor, administrator or assigns, or to one of them, the full sole and entire sum of twenty pounds of good and
- lawful money of England, together also with forty shillings of like money which shalbe then due for one whole year's rent of the said annuity. Also all other or every of the same, if any be in and upon
- the third day of December which shalbe in the year of our lord god one thousand, five hundred, four score and eight between the hours of one and four of the clock in the afternoon of the same day
- or in or before the fourteenth day then next and immediately ensuing the said day of December between the said hours of one and four in the afternoon of the said fourteenth day, at or in
- the said mansion house of the said John and Ralph Duble situated as aforesaid, without any fraud or any further delay, that then and from thenceforth, this present writing shalbe and remain

### Steven Tebold's Purchase of Land

The indenture recording the sale of land in Chiddingstone to **Stephen Tebold** is one of the seven documents in **CKS:U1000/3/T1**. This land has belonged to **Thomas Willoughby** but, on his death in 1594, they had been sold to **Thomas Browne** and five of the seven documents are concerned with this sale. The other document is about land called **Pollin land** but it has not been investigated. Pollin land was part of the lands conveyed to Steven Tebold.

The Steven who purchased this land was the eldest son of John(3) Tebold and a wealthy lawyer owning a considerable amount of land in the locality - see Tebold in Families & Transcripts.

- This indenture witnessth that I, **Thomas Browne of Chiddingstone**, ironmaker,
- for and in consideration of four hundred pounds of good, English money to me by
- 3 Steven Theobald, Esquire, before hand satisfied and paid whereof I do acquit

- 4 the said Steven, his executors and assigns, have given, granted, bargained and sold,
- assured and set over, and by these present do give, grant, bargain, sell, assign
- and set over to the said Steven all those lands and hereditaments in **Chiddingstone**
- aforesaid, called **Pollin lands, Mylbrookes meade, Stonyfield** and others containing
- 8 three score acres, late the land of **Thimas Willoughby, Esquire**, and now in

- interest, possession, rendition, remainder, limitation, use, resort, claim and demand,

### The Waghorne Indentures of 1600, 1608 and 1609

Three indentures concerning the Waghornes of Speldhurst have survived (**CKS**: U/6000/6/T12).

- 30th June 1600 made between **John Waghorne** and **Daniel Waghorne**, his son, of **Speldhurst**.
- 26th May 1608 concerned some land called Swayland in Penshurst which **Edmond Waghorne** was granting to his father John.

## Robert Marchant, scriptor

The 1600 indenture was written by Robert Marchant. Two wills, written by Robert Marchant, both from Penshurst have been transcribed. The first was

written in 1623 and the second in 1635 when he was Richard Marchant, senior<sup>27</sup>. Given the length of time over which some other scriptors continued to write wills, it is not impossible that these three documents were all written by the same person.

The will of **Edmond Waghorne**, yeoman, proved in 1610 was also written by Richard Marchant and the initial "I" is decorated; this could be the will of John's son.

## The Indenture Concerning Swayland

Swayland consisted of 44 acres in Penshurst, Tonbridge and Bidborough held by the Waghornes on a long lease. It belonged to the "messuage or tenement" in which John and Edward lived. It included a bean plot and a hemp plot. Amongst the list of the names of the various parcels of land are the "father seems and the hither seems". Is "seems" name for a certain kind of land with father being "farther" and hither meaning the nearer ones?

The lease of all this land had been given to Edmond by his father and now he was giving it back to him. If the 1610 will was Edmond's, was he already ill in 1608 and were there advantages in it being owned John if Edmond was to die first? By giving it back to his father, they may have been saving payments which could have been due on the death of the person holding the lease.

John was to have it for sixty years, if he so long lived! During this time John was not to do "any manner of waste other than caring and pulling down of the houses" and was to pay Edmond, or his heirs, rent of one penny a year - if it was demanded.

### The 1609 Indenture

In this indenture Thomas Alfrey was possibly a cooper whilst Edward Waghorne is described as a yeoman of Speldhurst rather than Penshurst. In it, "quadringentis" pounds of good and legal money of England were to change hands. The witnesses were:

William Moyse, Nicholas Wood, and Humphrey Waxe with Nicholas Hooper, sen. writer.

William Moyse could be the testator of 1610 (p211<sup>28</sup>) or his son (p214).

### The Rents of the Manor of Wickhurst sold 1610

At the end of the sixteenth century John Beecher (x45<sup>33</sup>) was improving his mansion house at **Wickhurst in Leigh** which he left to his son John. In 1610 a sale was made of the rents of the manor of Wickhurst in Leigh so that, at some time between 1593 and 1610 the Beechers must have sold at least some of the Wickhurst property. From the reading of the indenture (**CKS**: **U1000/6/T11**), however, it seems that it was the authority to collect the rents rather than the actual property itself which was being sold. See **Families & Transcripts** for details of the Beechers.

Nathaniell Studley, the purchaser of the rents, is "of Grays Inn". His wife was the daughter of John Jylbert, a gentleman of Sevenoaks and Nathaniell must have spent a considerable time in the area since he witnessed at least three Sevenoaks wills, one each in the years 1606, 1615 and 1626. The man be bought them from was Sir Percival Willoughby of Wollaton in Nottinghamshire, knight. Percival was the son of Thomas Willoughby; there had been a Thomas Willoughby prominent in Kent at the time of the Armada.

The indenture is very clear that Nathaniell Studley was to have these rents and the "services and profits" which went with them in total and for ever. According to the indenture the rents themselves came to £1 a year; Nathaniell was paying £16 for them. The records of the rents for 1615 and 1620, as shown below, were less than half of this so that, if Nathaniel did not pay an extortiant price, the services and profits must have yielded at least £0.50 a year.

# Writing:

## John Dunmole & Thomas Haselden, Leigh 1612

This indenture (**CKS**: **U/1000/5/T8**) between John Dunmole of Wadhurst in Sussex and Thomas Haselden of Leigh was written by John Hooper, notary public and parish clerk of Tonbridge whom John Dunmole appointed his attorney. Wadhurst is about ten miles south of Tonbridge. There were Haseldens recorded in Leigh with the wills of two yeomen having survived: that of Thomas Haselden proved in 1572 and that of Edward Haselden in 1601. Neither has been transcribed.

The Hooper family wrote a large number of wills between 1558 and 1650, many of them decorated, the decoration often including the Hooper mark as does this indenture. Two originals have survived. One has a number of minor crossings out and this was probably the one written first. Then a copy would be made on the same piece of paper so that each could have a writing, the two copies matching by the way they had been divided: an indenture.

The writing concerns some land in Tonbridge and Leigh which had been mortgaged by Richard Polhill, gent. twelve years previously and, because of "the non payment of the sum of one hundred and ten pounds (due) at a certain day now long past" had been forfeited to John Dunmole who was now selling it to Thomas Haselden,

## Writing: James Godden, gent. of Sevenoaks, 1619

There are two writings, both written on 10th April 1619, concerning a "messuage or tenement, backside or yard" in Sevenoaks, adjoining the Schoolhouse lands. It seems that, in May 1618, James Godden, gent. of Sevenoaks, bought the messuage from Dennis Bull of Fennex Pellam in Essex, widow, for £24. When this "writing" was made in April 1619, Francis Harris was living in the messuage and time Godden had sold it to William Foster, a carpenter. This sale, for £12, was recorded in the second writing.

But there were some complications which are difficult to determine from the writings. It may be that Dennys Bull was challenging the sale in some way. The first writing is concerned with these.

Both writings (**CKS**: **U1000/2 T1**) were made by **John Hooper**, notary public and parish clerk of Tonbridge. The initial "T" of the first one is decorated with a face, as are a number of wills written by Hooper, and above "all christian" is a complex version of the Hooper "mark". The initial "T" of the second writing is slightly decorated and there are two Hooper marks side by side, at the top.

### Nurse Children

Wet-nursing, the breast feeding of babies by someone other than their mother, when used by the wealthy yeomen or country gentlemen was usually carried out by bringing a woman into the family home. In this case both the wet-nurse and the baby could be watched over by the parents. This type of wet-nursing was often employed by the wealthier families who can often be identified by the short interval between births of successive children. Breast-feeding is a natural contraceptive which was more effective in Tudor times because not only were babies fed on demand, other foods were not introduced until much later than is common at the present time.

This contraceptive effect is also noticeable in that when a baby died soon after baptism the next child was often born less than eighteen months later whereas, if the first child lived for a year the interval was well over two years. Thus John(3) Tebold and his wife Clemence, with fourteen children in just over twenty years, can be assumed to have employed a wet nurse who would have been a local woman who lived in as part of the Tebold family.

The alternative to bringing the wet nurse to the child was to send the baby to a wet-nurse, a much more dangerous method from the child's point of view. Most

parish records include the occasional burial of a "nurse child" who often came from London. The difficulty is, however, that the danger could be exaggerated in that whilst the burials of those that died were recorded the return to their parents of those who survived was not. Thus the following details record the children whose burial was recorded in the parish register, that is, the ones who did not survive.

Given the number of nurse children from London was there an intermediary who organised wet-nursing in places such as Seal, Sevenoaks and Shipbourne for parents in London? Dorothy McLaren<sup>45</sup> describes wet-nursing in Chesham in Buckinghamshire at the end of the sixteenth century. Chesham is about the same distance from London as Seal and for both villages about 6% of the recorded burials at this period were those of nurse children.

Between 1565 and 1608, twenty-seven burials of nurse children were recorded in Seal with only one later, in 1638. In Sevenoaks, between 1561 and 1646, forty-two such burials were recorded and in Shipbourne, eleven between 1575 and 1614.

# The Nurse Children of Seal

The deaths of the following twenty-eight children, nursed in Seal, are recorded, nearly two-thirds of them coming from London. In some cases where they were nursed is given. Whilst there were nine in the 1570s, four in the 1580s and nine in the 1590s, there were none recorded from London after 1608. Is it that the recording was not so accurate after the beginning of the 1600s when the minister and churchwardens changed much more frequently than in the sixteenth century? Did Seal lose its contacts with London or could it even be that nursing in Seal was so successful that there were no deaths to record? Although the latter is unlikely, even when deaths are recorded we have no way of knowing what proportion of the infants being nursed survived.

The burials of nurse children are given in date order but the entries in the register of burials show a number of families providing a wet-nursing service on a continuous basis - see Bramptons page 2.z.77, Brodes page 2.z.78, Hills page 2.z.79. The Christophers seem to have carried out this service for two generations.

# Wet-nursing at the Christophers of Stonestreet

The Christophers were a large Seal family - see Families & Transcripts. In 1591, William Christopher (#251) was recorded as "of Stonestreet". He and his wife Agnes (#252) had had nine children in the twenty years 1567 to 1587. On 8th November 1575 a nurse child from London, nursed at Stonestreet was buried; no name, not even its sex, was given.

On 25th April 1594, Thomas (#1969), nursed at Stonestreet, was buried and, four years later, Thomas (#1995) the "son of **Thomas Gylmyn of Shoreham, gent.**", also a nurse child, was buried on 4th July 1598. Shoreham is only a few miles from Seal; was the first Thomas from the same family? Another Thomas Gylmyn, son of Thomas Gylmyn, gent. of Shoreham, was buried in Seal on 28th June 1599 but there is no mention of the him being a nurse child. Were all three sons of the gentleman from Shoreham? Were there other Gylmyn children not so unfortunate?

Agnes Christopher, suggested as the wetnurse for the 1575 nurse child, had a son, another William (#471) whose wife was Thomasina Swaynland (#1798). William and Thomasina had at least ten children between 1591 and 1614. Were the nurse children of the 1590s all nursed by Thomasina?

# Patrons & Vicars of Seal & Kemsing & Bequests to the Church

Unless otherwise stated, the details given are from Frampton: Incumbents of Kemsing with Seal, A.C. Vol. 20 (1893), pp.258-269, supplemented from the will where this has been transcribed. There could be other bequests to the church not included here

If the will is included in Families & Transcripts or More Families & Transcripts, the reader is referred to the appropriate section where details will be found under the name given. If the bequest is short, however, it is also included here. Not all wills which include bequests to the church are included here.

A few wills mentioned by Frampton are not in the database of wills included on this CD; such wills are marked with an \*. The article in A.C. includes a note that the transcripts of all the wills mentioned without a reference are to be found in the Registers of Rochester Wills at Somerset House; these have not been investigated. Since they were proved at Rochester they should be in the index of such wills held at CKS; it was from this index that the database on the CD was assembled.

# **Patrons**

The first known incumbent of "Kemsing with Seal" is Richard de Kemsing in 1265. He was a trusted friend an adviser to Countess Eleanor, lord of the manor from 1231 to 1265. With the commencement of the Episcopal Registers in 1319, there begins a fairly connected chain of Patrons.

The **Grandisons** were the Patrons of the church from at least 1326 until the 1390s with **Adam de Motterum** the patron of Thomas Ridlyngton who was installed in 1396. The patron of the last rector of Kemsing and Seal, Adam Usk, was the Archbishop.

A rector's income came from the **tithes** paid by his parishioners. These were usually one tenth of a landowner's or tenant's yearly proceeds and, at least until well into the sixteenth century, they were often paid in kind.

At the beginning of the fifteenth century, the Priory and Convent of St. Saviour's, Bermondsey became the patron and, soon after, the Priory became an Abbey and the Prior an Abbot. Henceforth, the Abbot received the tithes and appointed a vicar to whom he paid a stipend. Until the Reformation, the Abbot and Convent of St. Saviour's, Bermondsey were patrons of the parish except for the incumbency of William Lincoln. Lincoln was installed on 27th August 1508 his patron being

Robert Reade, gent. No patron is given after Thomas Tebold in 1525 until Thomas Taylor in 1554 whose patron was Queen Mary<sup>50</sup>.

There are difficulties in interpreting the surviving references partly because of the use of "rectory", "parsonage" and "vicarage".

In 1555 Queen Mary granted the rectory of Kemsing and Seal, valued at £9 13s 4d (£9.67) per year, to **Cardinal Pole** but on his death, it reverted to the Crown. The Queen was also the patron of Thomas Dale in 1558 but when Richard Tebold died in 1570 he was possessed, for a term of years to come, of the parsonage of Kemsing and Seal. His wife, Katherine, was to have this, taking the yearly profit "to her own behoof and sole fee" until their son James was twenty-one upon condition that she "shall yearly continue and pay the rent . . due to our sovereign Lady, the Queen . . and she shall not do, permit, cause or suffer to be done . . anything or things whereby the said lease and term of years shall be forfeit, determined, made void or cease".

Later, presumably after Richard's "term of years" had ended, Queen Elizabeth granted the patronage to **Sir Peter Manwood**, the son of Dorothy Tebold, and Richard's nephew. She granted the advowson of the vicarage with the manor to **Henry Carey, Lord Hunsdon**.

# Rectors & Vicars

Up until 1402, the incumbents were rectors and received the tithes themselves. On 12th Ovtober 1402 an endowment was made for a perpetual vicar<sup>51</sup> which meant that the patron received the tithes and paid the vicar an agreed stipend. The details of each incumbent are taken from Frampton with additional comments, etc. being either acknowledged or shown in orange.

#### Rectors

## Richard de Kemsing ?? - 1288

rector in 1265

He was evidently the trusted friend and adviser of the Countess Eleanor (sister of Henry III and lord of the manor of Kemsing with Seal) at the time when political troubles were thickening round her husband **Simon de Montfort** which were only terminated by his death in August 1265. The Countess's Household Roll, recording the daily expenditure of her establishment from 19th February to 29th August 1265 makes frequent mention of Richard "persona of Kemesinge". He stayed with her for two or three days at Odiham, at Porchester and at Dover Castle

from where she went to France and the Dominican Convent of Montargis. The Household Roll mentions fodder for forty-five horses on 4th June, four of which belonged to the "parson of Kemsing".

Henry III, whose quarrel had been with de Montfort rather than Eleanor, accepted Richard as rector; there is an entry in the Patent Rolls dated 1st November 1265 recording that Richard "persona ecclesie de Kemesing" obtained the king's "protection" He remained rector until his death in 1288<sup>53</sup>.

#### Jacobus Sinobaldi

rector in 1294

His name appears in a list of rectors who obtained "protection" of the King (Edward I) in 1294 in return for granting half the value of their benefices to enable him to prosecute his war with France. In connection with this impost laid on the clergy, the Annals of England notes "As the clergy did not meet his demands so readily as he expected, the king sent one of his knights to their assembly in the refectory at Westminster, September 21, who in a loud and menacing voice delivered this very intelligible message: 'Holy fathers, this is the demand of the King - one half of all the annual revenues of your churches. If anyone objects to

this let him stand forth that he may be taken note of as unworthy of the King's peace'. When they heard this, all the prelates were disturbed in mind and immediately they granted the King's demand."

#### John de Dittone

rector in 1316-7

He was a canon of St.Paul's in the years 1310 to 1326. Thomas de Wouldham, Bishop of Rochester, appointed him one of the executors of his will dated Sunday, 27th February 1316/7 and, in recognition of his services in that capacity, left him a bequest of 40s.

# Richard de Theukesbury

installed 5 Feb 1326/7 Presented by William Grandison.

#### Richard Duraunt

#### Gilbert de Keleshill 1339-1341

installed 28 Feb 1338/9 exchanged with the last

Previously rector of Merstham. On 18th September 1339 he obtained the royal licence to accept from Robert Fremlyn of Kemsing a rod of land lying adjacent to the rectory house and to annex it thereto for the purpose of enlargement<sup>54</sup>.

## Thomas de Hope 1341-1348

installed 27 Mar 1341 on death of the last

He came from the Hereford diocese. His name is mentioned in a dispute about tithes with Richard Waston of Seal on 17th December 1347. He must have died a few days after as probate of his will was granted on Tuesday, 8th January  $1347/8^{55}$ .

# Richard Mowys

rector in 1370

On 25th July 1370, Mowys "leased the church of Kemsing, with the parsonage, tithes, oblations, etc. for two years to John Digges, clerk, and Robert de la Beche, clerk, for £30 per annum. The lessees were bound to provide, at their own expense, two parish chaplains who were to serve" Kemsing church and the chapel at Seal for the agreed term. Robert was probably the "Robert atte Beche" who, in 1368, was rector of the adjoining parish of Ightham.

Did Robert , with the assistance of John Digges, intend to carry out the duties of the two chaplains mentioned in the agreement. Presumably they expected to make more than £30 a year from this arrangement. Did Mowys have other interests from which he could make more money if he did not have the commitment to serve Kemsing and Seal?

A further point is raised by this agreement. The agreement specifies that Digges and Robert de la Beeche were to provide **two** parish chaplains. Does this mean

that a rector had to employ an assistant in order to be able to carry out his duties to both Seal and Kemsing?

# Richard Meany 1370

According to an entry in Bishop's Trillock's Register, under 30 August 1370, this cleric, who asserted he was Rector, made an appeal to the Chancellor's Court against the presentation to the living by the patron, Sir Thomas Grandison, of Thomas Perd, a Presbyter of the Exeter diocese. Perhaps "Meany" was a badly written version of "Mowys". This presentation might have been made by Grandison because he was not agreeable to the terms of the lease.

## Adam Usk, LL.D. 1399-

He was the last rector of Kemsing and Seal. About two months before being collated to this living by the Archbishop he had been instituted to the rectory of West Haningfield in the London diocese. He also held, at different times, considerable preferment elsewhere and "twice he narrowly escaped a bishopric but his enemies were strong enough to keep him out of both Hereford and St. David's". He is well known as the writer of one of the early Chronicles, 1377-1404. See Bowden for more details of Adam Usk's life which included him being exiled to Rome after he had stolen a horse and a bag containing a hundred shillings in Westminster<sup>56</sup>

#### Vicars

#### Rodelandus Kerbroke 1402-1417

installed 27 Oct 1402

On 12th October 1402 an endowment was made for a perpetual vicar and a few days later Mr. Kerbroke was instituted the first vicar of "Kemsing cum capella de Sele".

#### John Jordan 1417-

exchanged with the last 14th December 1417 previously chaplain of the chantry of Tenham

#### William Mathew -1422

#### Thomas Stowe 1422-

exchanged with the last 14th November 1422 was previously the rector of "fframyngham" in the diocese of Norwich. He is also mentioned as being vicar in 1426.

# Stephen Porchet 1426-

installed 6th November 1426

He appears also to have held the vicarage of Halling. Mentioned as being vicar in 1431.

#### John Gorsich 1438-

installed 23 Oct 1438 on resignation of the last

He was vicar of **Wrotham** from 1428 to 1435 and then rector of Norton, near **Faversham** until 1438. On his resignation in 1445 **Roger Blendon** was presented on 16th July but, for some reason not stated, he was not installed.

# Henry Esthaw 1445-1456

installed 28 Jul 1445

on resignation of the last

Prior to 1436 he was perpetual vicar of East Peckham but, on 10th September1436 he exchanged it for the rectory of **Offham**. He was domestic chaplain to William Wells, Bishop of Rochester and one of the witnesses to his will dated 7th February 1444. On 21st October 1448 he was constituted Dean of Malling.

He was a native of Yorkshire and was educated at Cambridge where he graduated B.A. in 1494, S.T.B. 1504 and S.T.P. 1507. He was domestic chaplain to John Fisher, Bishop of Rochester and was constituted Archdeacon of Rochester about 1515. On 13th July 1517 he was instituted to the rectory of Woodham Ferrers in Essex and the following year was elected of St. John's College, Cambridge.

The witnesses to the wills of Marion Olyver and John Porter included "Sir William Damport, cur." (curate). Since Tebold travelled on the continent for many of the years he was vicar, the curate must have been kept busy ministering to both Seal and Kemsing.

During the time that Tebold was vicar, the *Valor Ecclesiasticus* was drawn up. This states that the vicarage of Kemsing with the chapel of Seal was valued at £26 6s 8d from which was to be deducted £6 13s 4d, the stipend of the "Capellanus" who served Seal.

#### John Sennocke 1542-

In 1542, "John Sennocke, Vicar of Seal" was assessed as a contributor to the loan made to Henry VIII for £6. The highest assessment for Seal was for John Tebold (#1), Thomas's younger brother whose contribution was set at £6 13s 4d.

#### John Denman 1545-

See Denman in Families & Transcripts for a discussion of the two John Denmans. It was probably the prebend, (#3933), who was the vicar of Seal.

In addition to this parish and that of Leigh. those of Penshurst, Chiddingstone, Cowden and Town Malling benefited by the will of John Pelset who is spoken of as 'servant & bailey to the right Honorable the Lord Sydney'."

Families & Transcripts 1559 Thomas Mogier bequeathed 3s 4d to the "amending of the glass windows of the church of Seal".

# Kemsing & Seal 1649-50

It was about this time that Kemsing and Seal became separate parishes.

In 1649/50, Parliament ordered a Survey to be taken of all ecclesiastical benefices. The Commissioners drew up the following report of Seal:

"We answer that the parish of Seal is divided into three parsonages and one vicarage whereof one parsonage and the vicarage belongs to the parish church of Seal and is worth £35 per annum and one little house worth 20s per annum. That the cure is supplied with an able minister and that Master Goodwyn is the patron thereof and Master Marten the present incumbent who receives this £36 per annum for his salary. We find one other parsonage being impropriate belonging to one Mr. Bunce in the occupation of William Kipps and is worth £20 per annum. And the third parsonage we find also to be impropriate and belonging to Mistress Mary Nicolson in the occupation of Mr. George Nicolson, her father, and is worth £30 per annum. We find the church conveniently situated without any union. That there is no 60 chapel. And that this church is sufficient for this parish." 61

## Penshurst

At Christmas 1643, jewellery valued at £1246 and £306 in money was stolen from Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester who was presumably staying at Penshurst place. Details of this indictment are given below followed by a number of short indictments of people connected with Penshurst about whom nothing further is known.

## Jewellery & Gold Stolen from the Earl of Leicester

At the September 1644 Assizes Mary Sandford, wife of Charles Sandford of Sevenoaks, gent, was indicted for grand larceny and escape. She was accused of stealing jewellery and money from Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester on 27th December 1643 at Penshurst. The items taken were a great diamond mounted in gold (£1,200), 77 pearls on two strings and a necklace of 38 pearls (£40), 2 gold medals (£6), a purse (1s) and £306 in money.

The indictment was endorsed as a true bill by Elizabeth Woodgate, John Gates, Elizabeth Williams, Elizabeth Beecher, John Gay, gent., Thomas Dimblebie,

James Kirkham, [blank] Kirkham, John Hooper, Richard Hammes, Dorothy Hammes, Robert Whitinges.

On 30th January 1644 Mary Sandford was committed to Maidstone gaol by Sir Thomas Rivers and Sir Edward Gilbourne, JPs, for stealing jewels and gold from Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester, but, on 25th July 1644, she escaped.

John Whitehouse [crossed out] of Maidstone, yeoman, is indicted as an accessory.

The indictment was endorsed as a "true bill for Sandford; Ignoramus for Whitehouse". 62

Agnes Tikner, of Penshurst, spinster, was indicted for grand larceny. On 26th June 1571 she bewitched Robert Nicholas, the infant son of John Nicholas of Hoo All Hallows, labourer, so that he languished until 13th April and then died. She was found guilty and sentenced to hang<sup>63</sup>

#### March 1576 Assizes

William Lucas of Leigh, husbandman, and Robert Jones, of Penshurst, sawyer, were indicted for grand larceny. On 8th December 1575 at East Malling, they stole 2 oxen and 3 heifers (£12) from **Sir Thomas Palmer**, senior.

John Turnor, sen. of Leigh, husbandman, was indicted as an accessory. Jones was found not guilty. Lucas and Turnor found guilty; sentence unknown.<sup>64</sup>

## February 1592 Assizes

**Thomas Wood,** of Penshurst, tailor, was indicted for grand larceny. On 24th August 1591, he broke into the house of **Thomas Carter** at Penshurst and stole 4s in money and a Spanish sixpence.

Wood was found guilty but allowed benefit of clergy. 65

## July 1592 Assizes

**John Williams,** of Penshurst, labourer, was indicted for grand larceny. On 23rd June 1592, at Penshurst, he stole 2s 11d in money from **Henry Swan**. Williams was found guilty but allowed benefit of clergy.<sup>66</sup>

## February 1595 Assizes

**John Downwell** (or Downvyll), of Penshurst, labourer, was indicted for grand larceny. On 30th December 1594, at Penshurst, he stole a silver spoon (3s) from **Thomas James**, gent. Downwell was found not guilty<sup>67</sup>

## February 1598 Assizes

**Anthony Morion**, labourer, **Joan Morion**, his wife and **Frances Reynolds**, spinster. of Penshurst were indicted for burglary. On 26th October 1597 they burgled the house of **Edward Yonge** at Penshurst and stole a gown (30s), a petticoat (10s) and £2 in money.

Reynolds and Anthony Morion were found not guilty, Joan Morion was at large. 68

## February 1600 Assizes

Alice Jones, wife of William Jones, and Joan Lake, spinster, of Penshurst were indicted for grand larceny. On 30th September 1599, at Penshurst, they stole 3 pairs of sheets (31), a petticoat (10s) and 2 smocks (2s) from Joan Ashen, widow. They were found guilty and sentenced to hang. <sup>69</sup>

#### March 1601 Assizes

**John Josham**, of Penshurst, weaver, was indicted for grand larceny. On 18th November 1600, at Penshurst, he stole a sorrel mare (£5) from **John Ecter**. Josham was found guilty and sentenced to hang.<sup>70</sup>

## July 1601 Assizes

**Henry Bassett**, of Leigh, husbandman, was indicted for petty larceny. On 15th June 1601, at Penshurst, he stole 2 spoons (3d) and 2 neckerchiefs (6d) from **Edward Dartnowll** Bassett confessed and was whipped<sup>71</sup>

## July 1602 Assizes

Christopher White of Goudhurst, blacksmith, was indicted for grand larceny and burglary with a gap of fifteen months between the two crimes; the burglary was from a house in Penshurst.

Six months prior to the first of these, on 1st September 1600, at Goudhurst, he stole a pillowbar (2d), a neckerchief (6d), an apron (6d) and a basket (2d) from Lawrence Anokes

The first two charges were that

- on 28th February 1601, at Goudhurst, he stole 6 pairs of sheets (5s), 24 napkins (2s) and a pewter pot (12d) from **Edward Bradborne**.
- on 30th Apr 1602 he burgled the house of **Kellam Wylloughbye. esq.** at Penshurst and stole a cloak (30s) belonging to **Robert Fulman**.

He was found guilty on these two counts and sentenced to hang but seems to have been pardoned by general pardon. 72

The eldest son of Christopher Willoughby whose will was written in 1630 was Keneline (see Willoughby in More Families & Transcripts) and, by 1630, he had an

underage son. Was Keneline old enough in 1602 to be the Kellam Wylloughbye, esq. whose house was burgled in that year? Or was Kellam Christopher's brother?

### James I Assizes: 1609 & 1623

## July 1609 Assizes

**William Andrewes** of Penshurst, butcher, was indicted for grand larceny. On 24th March 1609 at Penshurst he stole a bright-bay mare (£3) from **Nicholas Wood**. Andrewes was found not guilty.<sup>73</sup>

## July 1623 Assizes

**Richard Treape** of Penshurst, labourer, was indicted for grand larceny. On 1st April 1623 at Penshurst, he stole a black horse (£5) from **Thomas Squyer**.(stet). Treape was found guilty and sentenced to hang.<sup>74</sup>

#### Charles I Assizes 1626 - 1647

Many of the references to Penshurst in the Assizes held during the reign of Charles I were to the erection and maintenance of cottages which did not have the required amount of land (4 acres) and to unlicensed tippling-houses (see pages 2.z.12 and 2.z.?).

## July 1626 Assizes

**James Bettes** of Penshurst, labourer, was indicted for grand larceny On 10th April 1626, at Penshurst he stole 6 ells of hempen cloth (7s) and 0.75 ell of hempen cloth (1s) from **Walter Woodgate** 

The indictment was endorsed as a true bill by Walter Woodgate.

James Bettes was found guilty and sentenced to hang but he was allowed benefit of clergy at the next assizes<sup>75</sup>

#### March 1629 Assizes

**Thomas Rootes**, labourer, and **John Stanton**, butcher, of Penshurst were indicted for grand larceny On 16th October 1628, at Penshurst, they stole 3 oxen (£15), 5 cows (£20) and a sorrel gelding (£6) from **Fortune**<sup>76</sup> **Woodgate**, gent. The indictment was endorsed as a true bill by Fortune Woodgate. Rootes found not guilty; Stanton at large

At the July 1629 and March 1630 Assizes a writ capias was served on John Stanton of Penshurst, butcher.<sup>77</sup>

## February 1635 Assizes

Hester Trendle of Chiddingstone, spinster, was indicted for grand larceny On 18th December 1634, at Penshurst she stole a brown loaf (4d), 4 shred pies (1s), a cheese (10d), 2 lbs pork (4d), ½ lb bacon (2d), 5 eggs (1d) and ½ lb suet (2d) from Nathaniel Symmonds

The indictment was endorsed as a true bill by Nathaniel Symmonds. Trendle was found guilty to the value of 10d and sentenced to be whipped.<sup>78</sup>

## July 1635 Assizes

John Pusy of Maidstone, shoemaker, was indicted for bigamy. On 14th January 1634 at Steyning, Sussex, he married Jane King of Steyning, spinster, while Ruth Asheid of Penshurst whom he had married on 10 Nov 1625, was still alive. The indictment was endorsed as a true bill by William Asheid and Thomas Plant(?) Pusy was found guilty but allowed benefit of clergy.<sup>79</sup>

## July 1635 Assizes

**James Browne** of Penshurst and **James Norris** of Sevenoaks, shoemakers, were indicted for **assault**. On the night of 16 June 1635 they assaulted **Edward Harris** in the highway at Tonbridge.

The indictment was endorsed as a true bill by Edward Harris and William Lunham Browne and Norris were found not guilty.<sup>80</sup>

## July 1638 Assizes

Two members of the grand jury were **George Cotton of Hadlow,** gent. and **Fortune Woodgate of** Penshurst, gent.

## August 1647 Assizes

**John Gurham** of **Leigh** and **Richard Latter** of Penshurst, millers, were indicted for poaching. On 31st March 1647 they broke into Penshurst or Northland Park at Penshurst and hunted and killed a buck (£2) belonging to Robert, earl of Leicester. The indictment was endorsed as a true bill by **Thomas Beare**, gent. <sup>81</sup>

## August 1647 Assizes

**Edmund Bottinge**, yeoman, **George Underhill**, tanner, and **Robert Turner**, yeoman, of Penshurst, were indicted for poaching. On 24th May 1648 they broke into Chafford Park and hunted deer belonging to **Sir John Rivers**.

The indictment was endorsed as a true bill by **Thomas Panell, Richard Barnes**, Ignoramus. 82

## Seal - Some Fines 1500-1573

These have now been superceded; to update them it will be necessary to go to the National Archives (Ruskin Ave, Kew, Richmond TW9 4DU; 020 8876 3444) and search their lists. National Archives will help anyone going to Kew but do not undertake such investigations themselves. The type of conversion required is, for example, File 69, No. 331 becomes Nat.Arch. C1/69/331 where it was necessary to find the "C" number but some are more complicated than this.

## **Shipbourne**

## The Highway Between Seal and Shipbourne

At the March 1629 Assizes the **inhabitants of Shipbourne** were indicted for not repairing a highway leading from the estate of **Richard Porter of Seal** to Shipbourne. The inhabitants were presented to the Grand Jury in July 1629 since "a highway in Shipbourne running beside land occupied by Richard Porter of Seal which has been presented before" had not been repaired. Yet again, in March 1630, the they were once more indicted "for not repairing a highway in Shipbourne".

In addition to these indictments, they were issued with a writ *venire facias* and a writ distringas at each of the half yearly Assizes from March 1630 until February 1640.<sup>89</sup>

The import of these writs is not known but a writ *distringas* could be issued to an individual or a group of people:

"writs, distringas, for the inhabitants of Ulcombe, Capel and Tudeley, Anthony Roper of Eltham, Esq., the inhabitants of the county of Kent, Eyborne hundred, Barclay hundred, Gravesend, Lewisham, Cranbrook and Sutton Valence, Henry Gibbs, . . of Ashford, . . . Henry Lee, gent. and William Tirrell of Hadlow, and the inhabitants of Shipbourne" 90

Since these were all places in Kent could this not have been reduced to:
"writs, distringas, for the inhabitants of the county of Kent"?

Perhaps the individuals needed to be named. What effect did the issuing of this writ from 1630 to 1640 have on the inhabitants of Shipbourne?

The Richard Porter was probably #1155 who married Ellen Kips with children born between 1610 and 1625. The road was probably the one that runs through Stone Street. See Porters in Families & Transcripts

## Forced Marriage at Shipbourne

There is a most unusual entry for the July 1622 Assizes:

Robert Hilles of Brook, tilemaker, was indicted for abduction.

"On 20th April 1622, in the highway at Saltwood, he abducted **Margaret Foxe**, daughter and heir of **John Foxe** of Selling and, on 16th April at Shipbourne, he forcibly married her." He was remanded on bail. 91

How did Hilles manage to persuade the clergyman to carry out the marriage?

Nicholas Cope (#1378), gent., of the Middle Temple (London) married in Seal on 19<sup>th</sup> January 1590. The surname of the woman he married was erased from the register, only "Ann" remaining. This is the only mention of the name Cope in Seal. What was Nicholas's connection with the village from which he chose his bride? After the marriage they probably lived in London.

Richard Corvell (#1366) married Thomasine Grave of Ightham (#1367) on 29th August 1589. Nothing further was recorded of them in either in Seal or Ightham.

The wife of - **Spillet** (\$629) was buried on 20<sup>th</sup> May 1596.

**John** (\$344), son of **John Standlie** (\$342) of **West Peckham** was baptised on 4<sup>th</sup> December 1585.

William Stanley (\$1964) married Anne Stretfield (\$1964) on 28<sup>th</sup> November 1644

**Abraham Staple** (\$1233) married — **Boother** (\$1235) on 15<sup>th</sup> October 1617 by a licence from Rochester.

**John** (\$561), son of **Edward Tapsfield** (\$384), was baptised on 18<sup>th</sup> June 1592. **George Tapsfield** (\$386) was baptised on 24<sup>th</sup> March 1587 but no father was given; he could have been John's elder brother.

Cicely (\$2132), daughter of William Terill (\$2130), was baptised on 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1648.

**John Thetcher** (\$1987) married **Agnes Appleby** (\$2001) on 6<sup>th</sup> February 1645 in Shipbourne.

**Frauncis** (\$319), daughter of **Thomas Thracy** (\$317), was baptised on  $14^{th}$  March 1585.

Sara (\$625), daughter of Thomas Tindley (\$623) was baptised on 23<sup>rd</sup> December 1595.

**John** (\$450), son of **Edward Tonbridge of Wrotham** (\$448), was baptised on 18<sup>th</sup> March 1599.

**Robert** (\$906), son of **Thomas Towne** (\$904), was baptised on 21<sup>st</sup> February 1608 and buried four days later on 25<sup>th</sup> February.

**Henry Wickenden** (\$1932) married **Mary Allen** (\$1950) on 18<sup>th</sup> September 1644. Nicholas and Henry could have been brothers.

A woman dwelling with **Robert Wickham** (\$594) was buried on 2<sup>nd</sup> March 1594 and a **child** out of the house of Robert Wickham was buried on 18<sup>th</sup> March 1594.

Dennis (\$2157), daughter of John Willeforth (\$2155), was baptised on 21st 1649.

William Yewell (\$1900) was buried on 10<sup>th</sup> September 1645.

# Unlicensed Tippling-Houses

Drunkenness and also "tippling", sitting drinking for more than one hour in a man's own township, was forbidden by Acts of 1603 and 1606. Ale or hopped beer was a nutritional necessity but only the larger households were able to be self-sufficient in its production. The poorer part of the population bought their ale, and often their bread as well, from a village alehouse for which an alehouse licence had been required since 1552. But the keeping of unlicensed alehouses and tippling-houses was very common - in 1644, twenty-five Essex villages had, between them, fifty-five licensed and fifty-two unlicensed ale-sellers. <sup>108</sup>.

Because records for neither the Quarter Sessions nor the Church Courts have survived for West Kent, the only information available is that from the records of the Assizes. Many more cases would have been handled at the lower levels.

In the chapter "Misadventure, Crime & Enterprise" in the History of Sevenoaks, the unlicensed tippling-houses are given and there is a description of a weekend which started with card playing on Saturday night and ended with one of them being attacked on Monday.

The Calendars for Assizes, which are the source of the references described here, covered East as well as West Kent and a few details are given for places in East Kent, for example Ashford and Leeds.

# The Derlynges from Kingsdown

The only case surviving for the reign of Queen Elizabeth is that of **Edward Derlynge** of Kingsdown, yeoman, who was indicted at the July 1598 Assizes for keeping an unlicensed tippling-house at **Kingsdown** between 6th August 1597 and 17th July 1598. Three years later, he arrived at the July 1601 Assizes as a prisoner and was indicted with **George Dyrlynge**, labourer, also from Kingsdown, for petty larceny. This time Edward was described as a husbandman. They were charged with stealing 2 pigs (11d), on 30th April 1601, from **Leonard Lovelace**. 109

This association of the keeping of unlicensed alehouses and petty crime was fairly common.

## The Reign of James I

The first entry regarding alehouses during the reign of James I was at the June 1611 Assizes:

John Rycard of Cranbrook and John Burrish of High Halden, victuallers, on 20th1 May 1611 allowed people to sit tippling and drinking in their houses for one hour, contrary to statute. [marginal note] these alehouses are to be put down.

At both the July 1612 and March 1613 Assizes writs requiring the sheriff of Kent to produce both these men were issued. 110

## Alehouses & Tippling in 1613

Prior to the March 1613 Assizes, there seems to have been a concerted effort to bring tippling and unlicensed alehouse offences to court<sup>111</sup>:

**Jonas Avyne** of **St. Mary Hoo**. victualler, on 7th February 1613 allowed **William Gyssam** and **Robert Copys** of St. Mary's to sit tippling in his house for most of the day.

Oliver Beale of Hunton, labourer, "keeps an unlicensed alehouse and has allowed tippling on the sabbath".

Keeping unlicensed alehouses:

- George Wilson, butcher, William Fydge, carpenter, and Edward Styles, cutler, of Leeds (see Edward Fidge of Leeds in 1625)
- **Philip Huggin**, labourer, of **Throwley**
- Thomas Jervyn, smith, of Egerton
- John Church of Newington.

Other items in the same entry include:

Thomas Harman of Benenden, victualler, on 8th March 1613 allowed Nicholas Shoesmyth of Benenden, tailor, to drink and play cards in his house for most of the day.

Ralph Cooke of Greenwich keeps ill order in his house and allows "suspected women" to haunt the place.

**John Scotes** *alias* Charles of Newington and **William Wood**, vicar of **Orpington**, are common drunkards.

### March 1625

**John Burlynge** and **Thomas Muncke**, both husbandmen, were each indicted for keeping an unlicensed tippling-house at **Eynsford** on 1st October 1624.

John Evans, of Maidstone, and Richard Tye and Edward Dartnoll, of Ashford, victuallers, were indicted for keeping unlicensed tippling-houses on 4th July 1624.

The verdict, in all three cases, is unknown. 112 but Edward Dartnoll was indicted again in July 1625 - see below

**Alexander Besbitch** of **Goudhurst** was presented to a grand jury for keeping an unlicensed tippling-house as was **Thomas Atkins** of **Hawkhurst**, victualler, for keeping ill-rule in the night-time. 113

## The Reign of Charles I

During the reign of Charles I there were many more indictments for the keeping of unlicensed tippling-houses, etc. than previously. These start in the first Assizes of the reign - July 1625. In many cases writs were also served upon the people indicted but these are included here only occasionally except for the period 1636 to 1647.

## July 1625

There were five separate indictments, four of them for Ashford where unlawful games were being played: 114

- William Plomley, labourer, and Elizabeth Gouldsmyth, widow, of Chiddingstone for keeping unlicensed tippling-houses at Chiddingstone from 1st April to 20th July 1625. This was endorsed by Jeremy Heaver as a true bill.

- **Henry Cloake** of **Ashford**, alehouse-keeper, for allowing unlawful games to be played in his alehouse at Ashford on 27th January 1625 and other occasions before and since. [endorsed] true bill.
- **Edward Dartnoll** of **Ashford**, alehouse-keeper, for allowing unlawful games to be played in his alehouse at Ashford on 6th February 1625 and other occasions before and since. [endorsed] true bill (he had been charged at the previous Assizes with keeping an unlicensed tippling-house).
- Richard Allan of Ashford, innkeeper, for allowing unlawful games to be played in his inn at Ashford on 4th February 1625 and other occasions before and since. [endorsed] true bill
- Ellis Sanderson of Ashford, alehouse-keeper, for allowing unlawful games to be played in his alehouse at Ashford on 15th January 1625 and other occasions before and since. [endorsed] true bill

- Thomas Farley, labourer, of Lenham
- Edward Fidge, Thomas Bensted and [blank] Howell, labourers of Leeds

- **John Fusbus**, labourer, of **Bearsted**
- William Markewick, labourer, of Brenchley
- Thomas Churchman, labourer, and Anne Glover, widow, of Woolwich
- Richard Jackson, labourer, and Alice Prestman, widow, of Lawson
- **Peter Munck**, labourer, of **Keston**
- Robert Bell, labourer, of East Farleigh
- **Henry Gilbert**, labourer, of **Frittenden**
- **Hugh Gilbert**, labourer, of **Benenden**
- Anthony Kent, Abraham Lewes, John Cocke, Thomas Stoode and George Ingaram, labourers of Chatham
- Paul Wiborne, Peter Shansted and Edward Redgwaye, labourers of Strood
- Thomas Collett, labourer, of Frindsbury
- Nicholas Kirke and Robert Smythe, labourers of Cliffe

who were all indicted for keeping unlicensed tippling-houses on 1st February 1625. [endorsed] true bill

### Entry 44 gives the following Presentments made to the Grand Jury:

- There are four alehouses in Bearsted parish where hitherto there has been only two. One of them is kept by **Robert Clerke** who is unlicensed. (Entry 42 above gives John Fusbus of Bearsted as keeping an unlicensed tippling-house)
- **John Loveringe** of **Langley**, alehouse-keeper, lives in a very unfit place and keeps disorder in his house.

### Tippling-houses in Ightham

At the July 1627 Assizes Benet Barratt, labourer of Ightham, was indicted for keeping an unlicensed tippling-house in Ightham<sup>115</sup>. He was indicted again in 1628 with others from Ightham being charged in 1628 and 1629. Barratt was served with various writs up to 1630 and the others up to 1639. See Benedict Barret in More Families & Transcripts for details.

### Keepers of unlicensed tippling-houses in Pembury

At the July 1629 Assizes, Lawrence Nevill, John Dann, Thomas Garrett and William Benge, labourers of Pembury, were amongst those indicted for keeping unlicensed tippling-houses between 1st April and 9th July 1629. At the March 1630 Assizes they were served with writs venire facias. William Benge and John Gibbons, sawyer, were indicted similarly a year later but William was now described as a carpenter. Thomas Garrett and William Benge (labourer) were also served with a writ capias at this Assizes. Perhaps there were two William Benges, one a labourer and the other a carpenter. 116

At the March 1631 Assizes the carpenter and John Gibbons were served with writs *venire facias* and the labourer and Thomas Garrett with writs *capias* in both March and July 1631<sup>117</sup>.

There was no further mention of a William Benge until February 1635 when William Benge, **William Cousens** and **Edward Terry**, all described as husbandmen of Pembury, were served with writs of attachment. These three were then

indicted for keeping unlicensed tippling-houses on several dates in 1634 and 1635. They were again served with writs of attachment in July 1635 and yet again in February 1636. 118

Meanwhile, Thomas Garrett and John Dann, with whom he had been associated from 1629, were being served with writs *capias* twice yearly from July 1632 to July 1638. Were these regularly issued writs a means of keeping men such as these under observation?

#### 1627 to 1635

The long lists of similar indictments continue only a few of which are given here:

At the July 1627 Assizes **Thomas Davis** of **Maidstone**, innholder, was indicted for keeping cards, dice, and tables in his house and serving drink at unseasonable hours of the night<sup>119</sup>

At the March 1629 Assizes, William Ware of Seal was presented to the Grand Jury for selling "beer without licence and in an unfit place" Like many others, writs of various forms were made against him at each of the Assizes up to July 1637 - see the Wares of Seal in More Families & Transcripts for more details.

Amongst others indicted for keeping unlicensed tippling houses on 1st January 1630 and other occasions was **Sarah Van**, widow, of **Tonbridge** who was served with writs in the same was as others such as those from Pembury.

- William Benge, carpenter, and John Gibbons, sawyer, of Pembury. 121

At the February Assizes, 1635 three husbandmen from Pembury were indicted for keeping an unlicensed tippling-house on several dates in 1634 and 1635. These included William Benge who was probably the same man as was indicted in 1630, now described as a husbandman rather than a carpenter. The other two were William Cousens and Edward Terrye. 122

A year later, **Edward Steede**, brewer, of **Cranbrook** was indicted for selling beer to two Cranbrook men who were not licensed to keep a tippling-house:

- 20 barrels on 1st July 1635 to **Alexander Jefferye**, labourer
- 10 barrels on 2nd July 1635 to **Samuel Harman**, victualler <sup>123</sup>

But by 1636 Sevenoaks had attracted the attention of the authorities with:

- **John Chapman**, victualler, and
- Thomas Raines, John Acourte alias Gardener, John Hawes, John Momon, William Smith, and John Swyfte, labourers

of Sevenoaks all being indicted for the keeping of unlicensed tippling-houses on 1st February 1636 and other occasions and:

John Chapman, John Askew, John Bartwell, John East, John Swyfte, and William Smith, labourers, and Mary Haywood, widow of Riverhead in Sevenoaks for the keeping of unlicensed tippling-houses on 1st July 1635 and other occasions. 124.

Were there two John Chapmans?

John Chapman, labourer of Riverhead, was indicted again, for the same offence, at the July 1637  $\mbox{\sc Assizes}^{\mbox{\sc 125}}$ 

### Indictments & Writs 1636 to 1647

Between 1636 and 1638 Isaac Dane and Thomas Curde, labourers of **Penshurst**, were served with writs of attachment. They were two of the labourers from various parishes indicted at the July 1638 Assizes indicted for keeping unlicensed tippling-houses on 1st February 1638 and other occasions. This was endorsed as a true bill<sup>126</sup>. The men were:

- Isaac Dane (ID) (sometimes Isaac Doe) of Penshurst
- Thomas Curde (TC) of Penshurst
- **George Piggott** (GP) of Cobham
- William Allen (WA) of Cobham up to entry 1627, Penshurst afterwards
- Thomas Barton (TB) of Woodchurch
- **William Sell** (WS) of Sturry
- **Thomas Imtege** (TI) of Chislet.

Between then and 1647, writs of attachment were issued against them as shown in the table below.

At the March 1641 Assizes **Isaac Dane** of Penshurst, now described as an alehouse-keeper, was again indicted for keeping unlicensed alehouses on 1st July 1640 and other occasions. When he was served with a writs of attachment from entry 1895 onwards he was given as Isaac Doe.

When he was indicted in 1641 he was one of many alehouse-keepers who came from Goudhurst, Gillingham, Stockbury, Chatham, Codsheath hundred, Brencley hundred, Sibertswold, East Farleigh and Sutton Valence. In addition to the alehouse-keepers, also charged with keeping unlicensed alehouses were two wives of alehouse-keepers, two widows and a butcher

### Tonbridge 1638 to 1648

At the February 1639 Assizes, a number of people were indicted for keeping unlicensed tippling-houses between 1st January 1638 and 27th February 1639. These were:

- William Woodden, maltster/brewer, who was also indicted for selling 60 barrels of beer to John Word, Christopher Constable and others unknown, unlicensed alehouse-keepers, at Tonbridge on 2nd January 1639.
- **David Cheeseman**, clothier
- William Wallis, miller
- **Alice Howe**, widow
- **Joyce Oater**, widow
- **Christopher Constable**, butcher. 128

Alice Howe had previously been indicted at the July 1638 Assizes for keeping an unlicensed tippling-house at Tonbridge on 1st May 1638 and served with a writ, *venire facias* at the February 1639 Assizes. She continues to appear in the records:

July 1639 writ capias

February 1640 writ of attachment; indictment for keeping an

unlicensed alehouse on 1st July 1639

March 1641 & 1642 writ of attachment

Her final appearance was at the September 1644 Assizes with three labourers of Tonbridge:

- Henry Burrell, Christopher Constable (a butcher in 1639) and Robert Shoebridge

all indicted for keeping unlicensed alehouses at Tonbridge on 1st July 1642<sup>129</sup>.

#### 1638 to 1648

A few of the other of indictments from the rest of Charles's reign are given here:

Amongst those indicted at the July 1640 Assizes for keeping unlicensed alehouses on 1st February 1640 was **Thomas Cousens** of **Pembury**<sup>130</sup>.

Amongst those indicted at the August 1641 Assizes for keeping unlicensed alehouses on 1st February 1641 and other occasions were

- Richard Smyth, victualler of Wrotham; he was also indicted at the September 1644 Assizes for keeping an unlicensed alehouse on 1st July 1642.
- Margaret Courte, widow, and John Warren, victualler, of Meopham<sup>132</sup>.

Amongst a very long list of people indicted at the March 1642 Assizes for keeping unlicensed alehouses on 1st August 1641 and other occasions were

- John Wood and John Chapman, victuallers, of Sevenoaks<sup>133</sup>.

At the September 1644 Assizes, Robert Swan and George Prawle, alehouse-keepers of Hadlow and West Malling respectively, were indicted for keeping unlicensed alehouses at Hadlow and West Malling on 1st July 1642<sup>134</sup>.

Amongst those indicted at the August 1645 Assizes for keeping unlicensed alehouses on 1st September 1644 and other occasions were:

- Alan Cryer and William Turner, victuallers, of Sevenoaks
- John Everest and John Baker, victuallers of Chevening
- John Barre, Thomas Symons and John Hearnden, victuallers of Sundridge<sup>135</sup>.

At the March 1647 Assizes Alan Cryer, alehouse keeper of Sevenoaks, was indicted for keeing ill-rule and allowing ill-disposed persons to meet illicitly by night in his house on 18th July 1646 and other occasions. **John Palmer**, alehouse keeper of **Leigh** was indicted on a similar charge. <sup>136</sup>.

At the August 1647 Assizes, two labourers of **West Malling** were indicted:

- Henry Rosemary for keeping a common tippling-house in which he allowed ill-rule and persons of ill fame and conversation to eat and drink on 16th March 1647 and other occasions.
- **Peter Cusens** for keeping an unlicensed tippling-house from 16th March to 5th August 1647<sup>137</sup>.

At the March 1648 Assizes, **William Cary**, labourer of **West Peckham**, was indicted for keeping an unlicensed tippling-house at West Peckham between 1st August 1647 and 7th March 1648<sup>138</sup>.

### Wills Proved at Two Courts

A number of wills were proved at two courts - the PCC in London and also at Rochester. Why this happened is not known. Those found are listed below. There seems nothing to separate these wills from the others: dates range from 1527 to 1639; they all come from different parishes; the testators include yeomen, widows, a clothier and a gentleman.

## Wills Proved Locally

There are a number of cases of wills being proved before the local vicar. In these cases a copy of the will was still made in the probate register.

#### For example:

- the will **Thomas Blatcher** of Shipbourne (CKS: Drb/Pwr 8.290), written 13th August 1517, was proved in June 1531 in the church of Malling, fourteen years after it was written. Since this is too early for his burial to have recorded in the parish register, it is not known when he died.

- the will of **William Gather** of Hadlow (CKS: Drb/Pw 9; Drb/Pwr 13.507) was proved before the vicar of Hadlow on 12th February 1570?

Below are given the wills proved before:

- Gilbert Jenyns, vicar of Seal from October 1561 to January 1603; three wills proved 1565, 1570 and 1592; these are the only wills proved by him which have survived
- Nicholas Hooper, curate of Shipbourne; one will in 1582; there could be others since not all Shipbourne wills have been investigated
- John Stockwood, vicar of Tonbridge., 12 wills proved before John Stockwood between 1586 and 1598 have been found, seven of them being proved in 1589.

## Authority to Prove Locally

In some cases the local proving of a will was authorised "by virtue of a commission" delivered to the person who would prove the particular will - see John Blatcher's will proved by Nicholas Hooper.

Sometimes a vicar was given authority to prove local wills for a given period and, from the number of wills proved by John Stockwood in 1589, it would seem that he had this authority that year. The reason why authority was given to prove an individual will or wills over a period of time is not known.

#### The Wills of 1589

In 1589 seven wills were proved by John Stockwood; four from Tonbridge and one each from Mereworth, West Peckham and Brenchley. Three more Tonbridge wills were proved in that year - plus any which have not survived.

The nuncupative will of William Lether, spoken on 11th March 1589, was written by Nicholas Hooper, ten weeks later, on 22nd May - see Lether in Families & Transcripts. John Stockwood's signature appears at the bottom of the original (CKS: Drb/Pwr 15), probably to authorise the report given by those who were present when William "spoke" his wishes. But since it was written by Hooper, who was curate of Shipbourne, could not he have authorised the will himself? There is, therefore, the possibility that John Stockwood's signature was part of a statement showing that he had proved the will.

The will of Thomas Rootes of Tonbridge, written on 4th April 1589, was proved on 16th September. The original of this will is damaged and it is possible that it was proved by John Stockwood. The will of John Myller of Tonbridge, written on 21st July 1589, was proved on 23rd October 1589 at the PCC; if it was initially proved by John Stockwood details of this would appear only on the original - see Myller in Families & Transcripts.

Even given that there could be other wills for which the records have not survived and executors would not have been forced to have a will proved in Tonbridge if they wished to go to London or Rochester, it would seem that John Stockwood had been given the authority to prove wills locally for most of 1589.

#### The Blatcher & Blundell Wills

Three wills for the Blatchers of Shipbourne have survived from the sixteenth century, those of Thomas proved in 1531, John in 1582 and William in 1585. All were proved locally.

The wills of William Blundell (1570) and his wife, Johane, (1586) were both proved in Tonbridge.

Was there some reason for wills for a particular family being proved locally?

## Wills proved before John Stockwood, vicar of Tonbridge
